SUBJECT: Motion to Submit Revised PR-
EVAP and Semi-Annual Report Template

RESOLUTION AND ORDER

I. Introduction and Background

On January 13, 2023, the Energy Bureau of the Puerto Rico Public Service Regulatory Board ("Energy Bureau") issued a Resolution and Order ("January 13 Resolution") regarding the Draft Phase I Electric Vehicle Plan ("Phase I EV Plan") and the Revised Draft for the Electric Vehicle Rate Design Proposal ("Interim TOU Rate"), ordering LUMA Energy, LLC and LUMA Energy ServCo, LLC (collectively referred as, "LUMA") to file a revised Final Phase I EV Plan by April 30, 2023 and to finish development of and launch the Interim TOU Rate by September 30, 2023.¹ The January 13 Resolution also ordered LUMA to file semi-annual reports with the Energy Bureau consistent with the directions set out in Section II C.²

On May 1, 2023, LUMA filed before the Energy Bureau a document titled *Motion to Submit Final Phase I EV Plan in Compliance with Resolution and Order of January 23, 2023*, which contained the document titled *Puerto Rico's Electric Vehicle Adoption Plan* ("PR-EVAP").

On June 6, 2023, the Energy Bureau issued a Resolution and Order ("June 6 Resolution") taking notice of the filing of the PR-EVAP.³

On February 12, 2024, the Energy Bureau issued a Resolution and Order ("February 12 Resolution") accepting the presentation presented by LUMA at the February 1 Hybrid Technical Conference and, among others, ordered LUMA to describe how LUMA plans to further engage with the public transportation and fleet sectors, especially those in disadvantaged communities, within its forthcoming PR-EVAP Semi-Annual Report.⁴

On February 29, 2024, LUMA filed a document titled *Motion to Submit Semi-Annual Report in Compliance with Order of January 13, 2023* ("February 29 Motion"), which included as Exhibit 1, the 2024 Fiscal Year Semi-Annual Report ("2024 Semi-Annual Report").

On April 23, 2024, the Energy Bureau issued a Resolution and Order ("April 23 Resolution") ordering LUMA to refile the Semi-Annual Report within thirty (30) days using the reporting template included as Attachment 4.

On May 24, 2024, LUMA filed a document titled *Motion to Submit a Revised Semi-Annual Report in Compliance with the Order of April 23, 2024* ("May 24 Motion"), which contained a revised version of its first Semi-Annual Report in compliance with the April 23 Resolution.

On April 30, 2024, LUMA filed a document titled *Informative Motion Regarding Launch of Interim EV TOU Rate and Request of Release from Requirement to File Billing Integration Reports*, where LUMA informed the Energy Bureau that it had completed the development and launch of the Interim EV TOU Rate.

From August 30, 2024 through September 2, 2025, LUMA filed Semi-Annual Reports with the Energy Bureau detailing progress and spending on the PR-EVAP.

On June 30, 2025, LUMA submitted its rate case filing in Case No. NEPR-AP-2023-0003, which contained a proposed Optimal and Constrained Budget to support the PR-EVAP for FY26-FY28 as included in Exhibit 7.00.⁵

On November 3, 2025, LUMA filed a document titled *Motion to Submit Revised PR-EVAP and Semi-Annual Report Template* ("November 3 Motion"), which included the *Revised Puerto Rico's Electric Vehicle Adoption Plan* ("Revised PR-EVAP") in Exhibit 1 and the *PR-EVAP Semi-Annual Report Template Proposal* as Exhibit 2. Within the November 3 Motion, LUMA requests that the Energy Bureau take notice of, and accept, the Revised PR-EVAP for FYs 2026, 2027, and 2028 and the proposed reporting template.

On January 7, 2026 the Energy Bureau issued a Resolution and Order ("January 7 Resolution") ordering LUMA to respond to information Request for Information ("ROI").

On January 22, 2026, LUMA filed a *Motion Submit Responses to Requests for Information in Compliance with Resolution and Order of Jan 7, 2026* ("January 22 Motion") containing responses to the ROIs in the January 7 Resolution.

On January 27, 2026 the Energy Bureau issued a Resolution and Order ("January 27 Resolution") taking notice of the November 3 Motion but informing LUMA it would not make further determinations on the Revised PR-EVAP until completing Case No. NEPR-AP-2023-0003. Through this motion, the Energy Bureau also ordered LUMA to continue implementing the current PR-EVAP until the end of FY2026 unless it decides on the Revised PR-EVAP before that date.

On February 27, 2026, LUMA filed a *Motion to Submit First Semi-Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2026* ("February 27 Motion").

On April 25, 2026, the Energy Bureau issued a Final Resolution and Order on Electricity Rates ("Final Resolution on Rates") in Case No. NEPR-AP-2023-0003. In the Final Resolution, the Energy Bureau approved LUMA's Constrained Budget for Professional and Technical Outsourced Services for the Customer Experience Department and approved LUMA's PR-EVAP Constrained Budget for FY26 through FY28, resulting in a PR-EVAP budget of \$100,000 per year and elimination of the EV TOU rate pilot.⁶

II. Discussion and Analysis

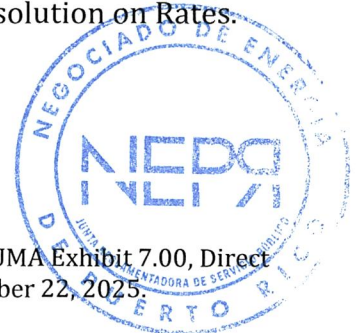
The Final Resolution on Rates impacts LUMA's Revised PR-EVAP in several ways. First, the Energy Bureau approved LUMA's PR-EVAP Constrained Budget in the Final Resolution on Rates, resulting in yearly budgets of \$100,000 for FY26, FY27, and FY28. The approved Constrained Budget does not support LUMA's Revised PR-EVAP, which included an estimated cost of \$700,000 for each year.⁷ In addition, the Energy Bureau's approval of the Constrained Budget for the PR-EVAP and for Professional and Technical Outsourced Services eliminates the EV TOU rate pilot.

The Energy Bureau cannot review LUMA's Revised PR-EVAP because it is not based on the PR-EVAP budgets for FY26, FY27, and FY28 as approved in the Final Resolution on Rates.

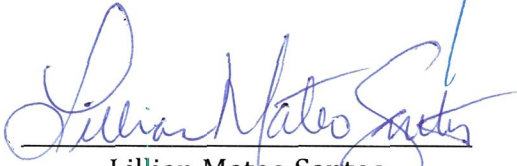
III. Conclusion
